The winter is done- crossed fingers-- and it is time for Pathway endeavours. So here is a catch-up for the end of last year and some plans for this year.

It's been a while since the last newsletter. It was a bit of a tough year for everyone, and a broken hand halted many things, including the newsletter last fall.

But we are back in business, we do have some news and here we go.

Overbrook Plaque

Sheila Perry and the Overbrook Community Association were delighted to receive the plaque with the poem "Ottawa" written by Benjamin Sulte.

Putting up plaques is never an easy process, and this one was the most difficult yet. Vanier's boundaries do not include any river shore- which is the Poets' Pathway route here- and although Riverain Park is leased to the City, a plaque was not deemed appropriate there. The land issues took months to unravel, but our plaque was unveiled Oct 28, beside the Rideau River at Prindiville and North River Road. We were delighted to be able to use this spot of City-owned land, and to have the poem "Ottawa" by francophone poet and historian



Benjamin Sulte, to erect in Overbrook beside Vanier.

We are grateful to the strong, supportive and active community associations of both Overbrook and Vanier, and to Mike Bulthuis and Sheila Perry.

Speakers at our unveiling were the lyrical Michel Thérien, and the learned Jean Yves Pelletier. We were grateful to Councillors Fleury and Clark for their understanding and support and for actually coming out to tromp through the biting wind that day. Although the day was cold, and windy beside the river, it was beautiful, with a bright blue sky and sunshine glinting off our pink granite rock, our shining bronze plaque and the waters beside us.

About 25 people attended the unveiling. Our reception

afterwards was at El Meson on Beechwood Avenue, where the owner opened for us outside his regular hours.

Jane's Walk: Sunday, May 4 at 11 am.

Enjoy Spring along the water's edge of the historic Rideau, with its ducks, old trees and waterfall.

Our fifth Jane's Walk is in Overbrook, along the Rideau River's serene and lovely shore line. The walk begins at our latest plaque, which displays Benjamin Sulte's "Ottawa", at Prindiville and North River Road, and continues downstream along the Rideau River past the Rideau Tennis Club.

Hear some facts and history of the Rideau, our own UNESCO World Heritage Site, and of the Rideau Tennis Club, which opened in 1912. Listen to some 19th century poems about the Rideau River, by our most celebrated poets. We will finish the walk at the tennis club, where we will have a tour, hear about the club and its past, and have a drink to end the walk.

To get to this walk, if you are driving, drive down the Vanier Parkway and turn north toward the river on Queen Mary. This road ends almost at the plaque.

Alta Vista plaque

We will be unveiling a new plaque, our ninth, in Grasshopper Hill Park in Alta Vista as soon as the ground is ready to support a heavy truck and a 3-ton rock. This will likely be towards the end of May, we are told by the landscape company.

Many thanks to the different community associations in Alta Vista, who all supported us, and to Councillor Hume and his assistants, Susan Scott and Alison Lynch.

Speakers will include Councillor Hume, Tony Bernard, President of the Alta Vista Community Association, historian and poet Steve Artelle, and student poet Adele Keyes.

The informal reception after the unveiling will be held at Rideau United Church.

We will let you know in an email and on our site, <u>www.poetspathway.ca</u>, as soon as a date has been arranged.

Woodroffe Plaque

We are hoping to unveil two more plaques this year- we want to finish unveiling at least one plaque in each of our walks by July 1, 2017, in time for Canada's sesquicentennial celebration. The first plaque is for the Centrepointe Community Association who support a plaque in their area. We have not settled on the spot yet, because our preferred site has been refused. This is the area where the Pathway changes direction to the east, at the entrance to the woods beside the new Archives building on Woodroffe. The City may want to sell or build on this land. Areas we are considering this year for our second plaque include the holding ponds near South Keys; somewhere near McKay Lake; and a second area in Alta Vista, as we have two walks there.

National Capital Commission

The National Capital Commission has been having discussion on its Urban Lands policies and has had several public meetings which we have attended. It is in large part thanks to the NCC that we have this beautiful city with its unspoiled areas of natural land along our river shores and other waterways. We would like the NCC to keep its urban lands too- especially those around McCarthy Woods, the Southern Corridor, and the land they own between Merivale and Woodroffe roads.

We have made proposals to the NCC under Urban Lands discussions. We are suggesting plaques along the Ottawa River and a stage where we could have talks, readings, concerts, theatre, art shows...

Other groups could use our playing space. Performance spaces are few and far between in the city, and they are much in demand and almost always very expensive.
